WHEREAS, the combined population of Flagler and Volusia County (Daytona Beach Community College's (DBCC) service district), is projected to grow to 650,000 by 2015; and,

WHEREAS, the national percentage of the population with baccalaureate degrees is 15.5%; and,

WHEREAS, Florida's percentage of the population with baccalaureate degrees is 14.3%; and,

WHEREAS, Volusia County's percentage of the population with baccalaureate degrees is 11.6%, and,

WHEREAS, Florida ranks 44<sup>th</sup> among the states for production of new baccalaureate degrees; and,

WHEREAS, the Florida Chamber of Commerce Cornerstone Report of 2003 states "Florida's production of baccalaureate and advanced degrees is insufficient to meet the demands of the next decade"; and,

WHEREAS, Volusia County seeks to provide the maximum economic development incentives for current, new and relocating business and industry; and,

WHEREAS, DBCC is integrally involved in economic development decisions in the area including efforts to attract new business and expand current business and industry which coincides with the economic development goals of Volusia County; and,

WHEREAS, the proposed Bachelor of Applied Science Degree in Supervision and Management will provide enhanced economic development opportunity for Volusia County; and,

WHEREAS, DBCC has surveyed and interviewed regional employers who have validated the need for the Bachelor of Applied Science Degree in Supervision and Management opportunities for the incumbent workforce; and,

WHEREAS, advertised jobs in the Volusia and Flagler County region support the need for applicants with baccalaureate degrees; and,

WHEREAS, local business and industry drive economic development efforts and employ A.S. graduates; and,

WHEREAS, many experienced incumbent workers holding Associate in Science Degree credentials seek management and supervisory positions in the regional workforce; and,

WHEREAS, many of these incumbent workers are place-bound by work and family obligations and seek the most affordable access to this degree; and,

WHEREAS, DBCC trains and retrain more of the regional workforce than any other postsecondary education institution through flexible class schedules and at a reasonable cost; and,

WHEREAS, DBCC's mission has a major emphasis in technical workforce development along with a major emphasis in economic development; and,

WHEREAS, DBCC works closely with local business and industry to develop workplace competencies; and,

WHEREAS, DBCC partners with area business and industry to develop education and training programs to meet the employer's needs; and,

WHEREAS, DBCC is ideally positioned to offer this workforce baccalaureate degree and has identified this specific need; and,

WHEREAS, DBCC has received support for this initiative from local Chambers of Commerce, local business and industry, and the Volusia/Flagler Workforce Development Board; and,

WHEREAS, DBCC will not change its open-door access to all students and will continue its commitment to local business and industry to meet the education and training needs of the local workforce; and,

WHEREAS, DBCC has partnered with Volusia and Flagler County Schools for workforce higher education opportunities for high school juniors and seniors through the Advanced Technology Center; and,

WHEREAS, through this particular degree, DBCC will be providing baccalaureate access to an "un-served" regional population,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE VOLUSIA COUNTY COUNCIL, THAT:

The Volusia County Council supports Daytona Beach Community College's proposal to offer the Bachelor of Applied Science Degree in Supervision and Management.
