Q: How can students earn high school credit in certain courses without the requirement of enrolling in or completing the course?

- <u>Section 1007.27(2)</u>, <u>Florida Statutes</u>, requires the Articulation Coordinating Committee
 (ACC) to establish passing scores and course and credit equivalents for Advanced
 Placement (AP), Advanced International Certificate of Education Program (AICE),
 International Baccalaureate (IB), and College-Level Examination Program (CLEP) exams.

Q: Do AP and Dual Enrollment students seeking the 24 credit standard high school diploma have to meet the Financial Literacy graduation requirement?

- Students in AP and dual enrollment courses are required to be instructed in all of the financial literacy content associated with the SS.912.FL: Financial Literacy Strand and its related standards and benchmarks.
- How the SS.912.FL: Financial Literacy Strand and its related standards and benchmarks is covered with these students is a district decision.
- The Personal Financial Literacy elective courses are an option. You may want to consult with your district's General Council to ensure compliance with statute.

Q: Do IB and AICE students have to meet the Financial Literacy graduation requirement?

Students in an IB or AICE diploma program are not required to be instructed in content
outside the scope of the program's courses provided that the student successfully
completes the IB or AICE "curriculum." This means successful completion of the courses,
not necessarily successful completion of the exams which lead to the diploma. Students
who do not successfully complete the courses are required to meet the standard diploma
requirements.

Q: Are students enrolled in dual enrollment United States History courses required to take the End of Course Assessment?

- According to the <u>NGSSS EOC Assessments Fact Sheet</u> students enrolled in dual enrollment United States History courses are not required to take the End of Course Assessment.
- While these courses do not require the EOC Assessment, to earn the scholar diploma
 designation there are requirements to pass the EOC Assessments. Students may earn one
 or more designations on their standard high school diploma—the scholar designation and
 the merit designation per s. 1003.4285, F.S. Requirements are listed in the graduation
 requirements charts by grade nine entering cohort year.

Q: What content is taught in the State of Florida's public schools?

 The Next Generation Sunshine State Standards establish the core content of the curricula to be taught in the state and specify the core content knowledge and skills that K-12 public school students are expected to acquire. For more information review <u>s. 1003.41</u>, <u>Florida</u> Statutes.
