5th Annual Apple Rally FUN

What do you get when you mix 34 pizzas, \$60 in ice cream, 12 rolls of toilet paper, and over 70 teenagers? The Fifth Annual Apple Rally! On September 5, 2014, the members of the Academy of Future Teachers gathered together to host the Apple Rally—an event to officially induct new freshmen into the Academy, team building with members from other grades, and welcome the new school year. The rally is run and planned—soulfully—by the student officers of the FFEA chapter. (All 12 of us!)

Of course the rally featured tons of food, 34 pizzas to be exact, and we finished off with an ice cream social. The feature of the rally was a Mentor-Mentee program where each freshman is paired with an anonymous upperclassman mentor. During the week leading up to the rally, mentees received a series of letters containing secret clues about their mentors identities. Mentees had to have some serious detective skills if they wanted to identify their mentor before the rally! Some of the clues featured descriptions of the mentor's backpack, what the mentors would be wearing to the rally, and what teachers the mentor had during his/her lunch block. Mentees were finally introduced to their mentors at the Apple Rally through a fun game of Red Rover. This was just the first event out of

many where the mentors and mentees will come together for other activities that will allow them to build long-lasting bonds.

So what about the toilet paper? After the mentor-mentee introductions, the officers guided all members into team building games including a 70 person contest of "rock-paper-scissors," a game called "show and tell," and "toilet paper tell"—a game where students had three seconds to gather as much toilet paper as possible, but then they had to tell their teams a fact about themselves for each square gathered. After the rally was over, students migrated to the football stadium to attend the year's first home game with their mentors and mentees. This event was definitely one that will be remembered by all!


Naples High School, Collier County


Hailey Heaslip, Chapter Parliamentarian
