# More Florida Schools Earn "A" Grades as State Prepares for New Grading System with Focus on Student Success Factors

According to preliminary data released in July by the Florida Department of Education, the number of elementary and middle schools earning an "A" grade increased by 195 (seven percentage points) more than last year in the final year of the current grading system. Overall, 962 elementary and middle schools statewide earned the top grade.

Although the number of schools earning an "F" grade this year also increased, the Department is focused on ensuring all low performing schools are provided the necessary assistance and support they need to help their students achieve.

"The increase in the number of schools earning an 'A' this year is great news for students and teachers who have worked hard for this success," said Commissioner Pam Stewart. "I appreciate the work by the educators, families and students. I know they will continue to improve in the future even as we transition to a new grading system."

The new grading system will support the more rigorous Florida Standards and the Florida Standards Assessment, which will replace the FCAT. The new school grading formula will be more simple, transparent and lead to improved student achievement.

"The new grading system that will start next year will continue to be crafted with input from parents, teachers and educators," Stewart said .

## Governor and First Lady Scott Announce Hispanic Heritage Month Contests

students in Florida. The theme for
Florida's Hispanic Heritage Month
contests is "Hispanic Culture: Living
the American Dream in Florida."

The Governor and First Lady also requested nominations for the Hispanic Heritage Month Excellence in Education Award, which will be presented to a Hispanic full-time educator in a Florida elementary, middle or high school.

Governor Scott said, "Florida's Hispanic community continues to contribute to our economic, cultural, and family values, and the 2014 Hispanic Heritage Month Contests will help students appreciate these contributions and encourage our young people to live their version of the American Dream. Last year we celebrated 500 years of history and cultural diversity throughout Florida, and the upcoming Hispanic Heritage Month adds to this celebration by recognizing the accomplishments Florida's Hispanic community have made throughout history."

Governor and First Lady Scott have chosen a Miami artist, Manena, as the featured artist for their observance of Hispanic Heritage Month. Manena's artwork will be



featured in the Governor's Mansion and highlighted during the Hispanic Heritage Month celebration.

Governor Scott's annual Hispanic Heritage Month Excellence in Education Award contest is open to all Hispanic, full-time educators in an elementary, middle or high school in Florida. Three winners will be selected: one elementary teacher (grades K-5), one middle school teacher (grades 6-8), and one high school teacher (grades 9-12).

## **Personal Learning Accounts**

The Personal Learning Scholarship Account Program was established to provide options to parents of students with specific disabilities to better meet the individual educational needs their eligible children. Parents of eligible children may use the accounts to purchase approved products or services.

To be eligible to receive a scholarship, a student must meet the following eligibility criteria:

- 1. Is a resident of Florida;
- 2. Is eligible to enroll in kindergarten-grade 12 in a public school in Florida;
- 3. Has the following disability: Autism, as defined in  $\underline{s}$ . 393.063(3), F.S.; cerebral palsy, as defined in  $\underline{s}$ . 393.063 (4), F.S.; Down syndrome, as defined in  $\underline{s}$ . 393.063(13), F.S.; an intellectual disability, as defined in  $\underline{s}$ . 393.063 (21), F.S.; Prader-Willi syndrome, as defined in  $\underline{s}$ . 393.063(25), F.S.; or Spina bifida, as defined in  $\underline{s}$ . 393.063(36), F.S.; for a student in kindergarten, being a high-risk child, as defined in  $\underline{s}$ . 393.063(20)(a), F.S.; and Williams syndrome.
- 4. Is the subject of an IEP written in accordance with rules of the State Board of Education or has received a diagnosis of a disability as defined below from a physician who is licensed under <u>chapter 458</u> or <u>chapter 459</u> or a psychologist who is licensed in Florida.

#### Not Just Shop Class: The Benefits of Career and Technical Education

Career and Technical Education gives students a head start on college and careers in high-skill, high-wage and high-demand jobs.

Many Career and Technical Education, or CTE, programs allow students the opportunity to earn college credit, industry certifications or both. As an added bonus, many CTE programs connect to a similar state college program, which makes it possible for students to move from high school to college.

Students can receive industry certification in a number of career areas such as health science, hospitality and tourism, information technology and more.

According to the 2012-13 Career and Professional Education Act Enrollment and Performance Report, students enrolled in CTE programs on average had higher GPAs, were regularly present for school, took at least one advanced course, were less likely to drop out and were more likely to earn a standard high school diploma. ## Staying up-to-date with immunizations

Both public/non-public school children entering, attending or transferring to Florida K-12 schools are required to have the following immunizations:

- Four or five doses of DTaP
- Three, four, or five doses of IPV
- Two doses of MMR
- Two or three doses of hep B
- Two doses of Varicella (kindergarten effective with 2008–2009 school year, then an additional grade is added each year thereafter).

In addition to compliance with all other immunization requirements, children entering, attending or transferring to the seventh grade in

Florida schools must complete one tetanusdiphtheriapertussis (Tdap).

Immunization Awareness Month (NIAM). There are numerous events to highlight the importance of immunization for people of all ages.
