



Response: The district provided professional development to all principals and SAC chairs, regarding the school improvement process, during the last week of July and first week of August to follow-up the data training during this project period. The data training was conducted by personnel from The Office of School Improvement, The Title I Office, and The Office of Assessment and Accountability. During this grant project period, Professional Learning Communities will implement the FCIM for on-going data analysis and student interventions. All schools in Differentiated Accountability will submit baseline data and complete a midyear report analyzing their specific school data. In addition, Intervene schools will analyze data twice per quarter with assistance from the State Regional Area Director. After analyzing their specific school data, instructional calendars will be adjusted to meet the needs of all students. Interventions will be provided.

LEA Support Teams

Response: Technical and program assistance will be provided for all schools in the project. Hillsborough County Public Schools (HCPS) will work within the framework of its current district level support structure. This structure is intended to provide SINI Title 1 schools with access to both leadership and support to enable student achievement growth within the context of each school. The leadership component is teamed across district divisions. The three General Directors (Elementary Education, Middle School Education and Secondary Education), the Director of Federal Programs, the Principal on Special Assignment for School Improvement and the Director of Staff Development plan resource integration in response to school needs. The support team, working directly with the schools, consists of the Supervisor for Title I School Improvement, the District Resource Teacher for School Improvement, Supervisors for Staff Development, and the Elementary Supervisor/Generalists. This team provides support to the schools by developing instructional materials, providing professional counsel, and working with teachers and the School Advisory Committee. This collaborative framework will enable a unity of effort that will result in the diversity of action needed to ensure success for each individual school. This support team meets twice per month for 1-2 hours. Technical and program assistance activities occur weekly throughout the project period and respond to the individual needs of each school.

Response: The purpose of providing high needs schools with resource personnel is to support teachers through modeling and coaching. In addition, expert resource teachers will co-teach and work with students to increase student achievement. The research of effectiveness includes: "To better understand the impact of coaching on student achievement, Showers (1884) conducted a follow-up study with 21 teachers and 138 students...10 teachers received coaching from six Peer Coaches, four teachers received partial coaching, and five were not coached. Two important findings emerged. First, coached teachers were more likely than non-coached peers to transfer newly acquired teaching practices into classroom use. Second, coaching contributed significantly to higher student achievement scores as measured by a concept attained measure." Showers, b (1984), Peer coaching: A Strategy for facilitating transfer of training, OR: Center for Educational Policy and Management. The strategy will support the implementation of DA by providing support in content areas and for subgroups not making AYP by utilizing resource teachers for those areas

Response: The root cause addressed in regards to DA and SINI status as a result of low academic achievement is teacher effectiveness.

Response: The targeted populations for the strategy include all content areas and subgroups not

making AYP. Specific school site targeted populations and content areas are reflected in their School Improvement Plan. In addition, the targeted outcome to increase student achievement, for all schools in the grant, is to increase their overall AYP percentage by at least 5% or more.

Response: The structure that is already in place in regard to this strategy is aligned with the individual school's School Improvment Plan. In addition, the District created a best-practices job description for resource personnel and utilizes a screening committeee to provide schools with a pool of qualified resource teachers. After the Principal hires the resource teacher, in alignment with the specific needs of their target areas, they submit to the District office the job description specific to their school site as well as a daily schedule for that resource person. To support resource teachers, the District Content Area Supervisors provide monthly professional development training. The current capacity is fiscally supported with Title I funds and ARRA funding; no state or local funds are utilized.

Response: The frequency and duration of this strategy is daily and is outlined specifically for resource personnel in their job description and daily schedule.

Response: The Principal will be in charge of monitoring at the school site. Area Directors, Elementary Generalists, and Elementary & Secondary Content Supervisors, will receive the job description and daily schedules of the resource personnel in their area.

Response: The progress monitoring tool that will be utilized is The Classroom Walkthrough Evaluation Tool. In addition, teacher evaluations will be conducted by the Principal in the Spring.

Response: The frequency of progress monitoring is daily by the Principal. Progress monitoring by District personnel will occur in accordance with the individual needs of the schools.

Response: The purpose of the strategy is to attract and retain highly qualified and effective teachers in high needs schools. The research of effectiveness in implementing this strategy is found in the following study: "Figlio and Kenny collected surveys from 534 schools that were among 1,319 public and private schools participating in a national study sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education beginning in 1988. They also collected data on the frequency and magnitude of school salary incentives, analyzing it in relation to student achievement. That achievement was measured in the earlier U.S. Department of Education study on eighth-graders, with follow-up surveys done in 10th and 12th grades. Students at schools with teacher pay-for-performance programs scored an average of one to two percentage points higher on standardized tests than their peers at schools where no bonuses were offered, Figlio said."

January 2007, University of Florida News. The strategy will support the implementation of DA by providing a differential pay program based on student achievement to attract and retain highly qualified and effective teachers.

Response: The root cause in regard to DA and SINI status is attracting and retaining highly qualified and effective teachers.

Response: The targeted population for this strategy is highly qualified and effective teachers in high needs schools. In addition, the targeted outcome to increase student achievement, for all schools in the grant, is to increase their overall AYP percentage by at least 5% or more.

1h. Describe the Current Capacity to implement the above strategy. If this is a new strategy, indicate in this response "New Strategy."

Response: The structure that is already in place to attract and retain highly qualified and effective teachers is through specific district strategies which include: District Interview Day, Renaissance Schools Fair (schools with 90% or above students on free and reduced priced

lunch), and the Merit Award Program(MAP). The current capacity is fiscally supported with Title I funds and ARRA funding; no state or local funds are utilized.

1i. Frequency and duration of this strategy (For example: three days per week after school for nine weeks starting the week of January 7th.)

Response: The Salary Differential Program is based on a two tier system. Tier I teachers qualify for a 5% increase in pay (2% for first year teachers) who meet the following criteria: the teachers must have a satisfactory evaluation, be highly qualified, and complete an Individual Professional Development Plan. The 2% or 5% increase in pay is reflected in each pay period (about every two weeks). In order for teachers to receive the project funded Tier II bonus, they must first meet the Tier I criteria. In addition, teachers and administrators that receive the Tier II one-time supplemental pay check must meet the student achievement requirement. The check for Tier II will be received by administrators and teachers in October 2009.

2. Who will be in charge of monitoring implementation of the strategy?

Response: The General Director of Federal Programs and the Renaissance Schools Principals will be in charge of monitoring the implementation of this strategy.

3. What progress monitoring tool will be used to track effectiveness of this strategy as measured by student progress.

Response: The Salary Differential Evaluation was completed this past year and was adjusted based on the evaluation. The progress monitoring tools are used to reflect the changes and increase student achievement. The progress monitoring tools that will be utilized to track the effectiveness of this strategy are the components of the program which include: student achievement data, IPDPs, evaluations, and teacher certifications (highly qualified.)The Salary Differential Program Evaluation will continue to be evaluated every three years.

Response: The frequency of progress monitoring works within the framework of Florida's Continuous Model and the Differentiated Accountabiliy Model. The Tier I qualifications (highly qualified, evaluations, and IPDP) timeline is completed by September 2009. Student achievement data is monitored through FCIM (at each school site) and School FCAT data provided by FDOE in July.

Response: The District ensures that The Salary Differential Program is a supplement, not supplant, by implementing the program in our Renaissance Schools (schools with 90% or more students on free and reduced priced lunch). This program is in addition to the district-wide Merit Award Program and is above and beyond the District's salary schedule for all teachers.
