The Florida Continuous Improvement Model will be the format for data analysis. After each data analysis meeting, teachers will adjust their curriculums to meet the needs of their students.

Response: Research has shown that knowledge-based professional development for teachers and administrators is directly tied to increased student achievment. The goals of the reading/writing professional development strategy are the following:

To increase teacher knowledge base in reading, writing, math and science through onsite professional development and a long term commitment to following the professional development cycle: planning, delivery, followup and evaluation.

To enhance high quality instructuion for all teachers.

To increase administrators' knowledge base in order that thye may observe, recognize and support high quality instruction.

Professional development for teachers that will positively impact student achievement is an important part of the implementation of Differentiated Accountability.

1f. Identify the Root Cause(s) each strategy will address to remove barriers to low academic achievement.

Response: The district has identified instructional methods as a root cause for low academic achievement. There are gaps in the achievement levels of the different subgroups and differences among the achievement of these subgroups at the various Title! SINI schools. The teachers in schools with the highest level of achievement had a commendable knowledge base.

Focusing resources to increase teacher knowledge base through onsite professional development and a long term commitment to the following professional development cycle: planning, devlivery, followup and evaluation will increase student achievement by an anticipated 5-10% in reading, math, writing and science. Foundational professional development was be the first phase of this process. The next phase will include onsite professional development and administrative professional development, combined with classroom obsevation and classroom modeling along with building deeper content knowledge in a workshop environment. Increasing teacher knowledge base in these subject areas will allow for increased student achievement.

Response: The targeted population for this strategy is the teachers at the six schools identified.

Response: Professional development has been provided in the areas of reading and writing. Our district- wide writing team has members who have been trained in 6-Traits Writing. They in turn have trained the teachers at each of their schools. Many of our teachers have attended the summer reading academies provided by Just Read Florida. Some of our teachers have participated in science academies at PAEC. Many of our teachers attended a professional development day focusing on Closing the Achievement Gap facilitated by Larry Bell. Kathy Oropallo, Linda Walker and Donna Szpyrka began to work in our district last year providing foundational professional devleopment in the areas of reading, writing, math and science.

Response: The consultants will be in each school one day each nine weeks. They will spend the entire school day 8:00-3:00 providing professional development during planning periods, classroom walkthroughs, and modeling lessons.

Response: School-based administrators and district directors will monitor the implementation of this strategy.

Response: As part of a federally funded study of NCLB's effects, RAND researchers found that supplemental educational services(tutoring) had a statiscally significant positive effect on student achievement in both reading and math in most districts.

In addition to examining achievement effects, researchers explored participation rates among different groups of students. First, students who participated in Title I supplemental educational services had lower achievement scores. Among racial and ethnic groups, African-American students had the highest rates of participation in supplemental services(tutoring). Hispanic students had higher participation rates than whites student in supplemental educational services (tutoring). Students with limited English proficiency and those with disabilities had relatively high participation rates in supplemental educational services (tutoring). Overall, the participants generally came from the disadvantaged populations that NCLB is intended to target.
