The Florida Tax Credit Scholarship Program

The Florida Tax Credit (FTC) Scholarship Program was established in 2001 to encourage private, voluntary contributions from corporate donors to non-profit scholarship funding organizations (SFOs) that award scholarships to children from low-income families. A corporation can receive a dollar-for-dollar tax credit up to 100% of its state income tax liability. The program has since been expanded to include credits against the insurance premium tax for contributions to eligible non-profit SFOs, credits against severance taxes on oil and gas production, self-accrued sales tax liabilities of direct pay permit holders, and alcoholic beverage taxes on beer, wine, and spirits. The maximum amount the state may award was \$447 million in credits for the 2015-2016 fiscal year. This program expands educational opportunities and school choice for children of families that have limited financial resources.

Summary of the June 2016 FTC Quarterly Report

The June 2016 FTC Quarterly Report is also considered the annual report because it is based on the cumulative data submitted by the Scholarship Funding Organizations for students who participated in the FTC Scholarship Program at any point during the 2015-2016 school year.

Step Up For Students and AAA Scholarship Foundation were the two approved participating SFOs for the 2015-16 school year. The two SFOs awarded a total of approximately \$418.6 million in FTC scholarships to 78,664 students enrolled in 1,602 participating Florida private schools.

The 78,664 students in 2015-2016 is an increase of 8,714 students over the 2014-2015 student total of 69,950 as reported in the June 2015 FTC Quarterly Report. This represents an enrollment increase of 12.5%. The 1,602 private schools participating in 2015-2016 represent an increase of 4.5% from the 1,533 private schools that participated during the 2014-2015 school year.

Some characteristics of the FTC student data include:

- Slightly more female students (51%) participate in the FTC program than male students (49%).
- Lower grade levels tend to have larger student enrollments. Students enrolled in Kindergarten through Grade 3 make up almost 48% of the scholarship recipients.
- The racial/ethnic breakdown reflects the diversity of students utilizing the FTC scholarship program, which includes:

African-American students (30%) Hispanic students (38%) White students (25%) Other students (7%)

• The top five districts (Dade, Orange, Broward, Duval, and Hillsborough) had over 45,000 students (57% of total participants) receiving approximately \$242 million in FTC scholarships (58% of total funding).





FTC Student Enrollment by Gender






FTC Student Enrollment by Race/Ethnicity



FTC Student Enrollment by SFO




