The Ocean Palms Elementary School project, Change for a Change, created a youth leadership model that is now being utilized by other groups. The innovative project started with former students that were service-minded and experienced in volunteering and leading OPES service projects. These students collaborated with current OPES students and attended a PTO event to collect pocket change for raising awareness for a music therapy grant benefitting their special needs students. The project then expanded to multiple sports clubs in the community and ultimately raised \$16,388. Through this work, OPES raised community awareness of music therapy and its benefit to special needs students. Similarly, the youth involved gained leadership, volunteer and service experiences. They worked directly with business partners and community leaders, ultimately strengthening relationships between students, staff, families and community partners.

The mission is to promote personal growth, self-responsibility and academic success for deserving, low-income students by providing a unique set of resources, including mentors, scholarships, long-term support, student advocacy and guaranteed educational opportunity. Through Project UNISON, Columbia High has expanded the traditional 1:1 ratio mentoring program to a schoolwide effort.

Chiefland Middle High School is working to address the issue of racial/ethnic disparities in discipline by listening to the families most affected by the disparity. The “Family Focus Group to Problem Solve and Ensure Equitable Discipline” project is intended to ensure that more equitable disciplinary measures are issued to Black/African American students who receive more office referrals and out-of-school suspensions in Florida than students of other races. Project staff meet with families to ask a series of questions in an effort to identify more effective approaches to discipline. The school intends to continue these conversations for the purpose of resolving conflicts, establishing positive relationships, and implementing more effective behavioral policies and practices. In turn, the project is nurturing relationships between the school and the families who are often excluded from conversations about school-based improvement efforts.

The iStand Club raises awareness about bullying and provides a platform for peer support so that students learn how to deal with situations of bullying. Club members model positive behavior, encouraging others to take a stand or get help if they see someone being bullied. iStand sponsors Unity Week, a national bullying awareness week in which students engage poster contests, theme days and signing anti-bullying banners. Videos highlighting the clubs message “Be an iStander, not a bystander” are made all year long and shown at school events. With the help of two local business partners, iStand acquired two playground benches where students on the playground can go if feeling excluded. When a child sits on the “Buddy Bench,” another student can invite them to play.

The program not only inspires students to be active and exercise but teaches them discipline and responsibility (they are expected to arrive on time, participate in activities and track their progress). Morning Mile serves more than 90 students each day, using volunteers from the U.S. army, parents and staff who coordinate activities and participate with students to keep them actively engaged. The increased involvement with individuals from the community, such as the 143rd Sustainment Command, is especially helpful to students whose only positive interactions with adults may be at school.

These soldiers were not receiving any communication, care packages or letters from friends or family in the United States. In response, students, families, faculty, staff, area schools and community partners came together to send care packages and letters of appreciation to these forgotten men and women for the duration of their tour. Edgewater brought other nearby schools into the initiative. Local businesses, such as Running Elements, set up supply boxes for drop locations and advertised the needed care package items on their Facebook business page. A ten-week class, scheduled at a time convenient for working parents, Sed de Saber gives English Language Learners parents a chance to enhance their language skills so they can effectively help their children with assignments. P.E.A.R.L.S (Pursuing Empowerment and Reclaiming Love for Self) is a mentoring program that assists middle school teen girls in building self-confidence and social skills so that they mature into determined, career-focused young women. Mentors work with behavior, encouraging the girls to attend school regularly and make good grades. Mentees are matched with mentors who engage them in activities that help build positive relationships, promote making good choices and build self-esteem. Each month, community partners are invited to lead learning workshops or community service events. The sheriff’s department, for example, gave a presentation on social media awareness; the local bank discussed the importance of financial literacy; and a local group called CAIRE worked with the girls on interpersonal skills and good decision-making.

One speaker, who was the brother of a flight attendant on Flight 93 which crashed on 9-11, spoke to the students about country, compassion and empathy. The goal of “The Familia that Reads: A Cultural Reading Experience,” is to provide the school community with an opportunity to experience reading and cultural exchange. Students, staff, faculty and families from Deltona High School, where a large percentage of families are of Hispanic descent, enjoyed a brief presentation on the importance of reading with the family. Family reading can promote literacy and embrace cultural heritage. The author of “Paws to Read” read her book in English followed by a student who read the same book in Spanish. Families were asked to participate in a reflective activity drawing on the story’s theme. The volunteers with the “Seniors in Service Foster Grandparent” program serve as tutors as well as mentors, offering reading support to struggling students and also taking time to listen, support and share their knowledge with these children. They assist in classrooms and during lunchtime, and provide supplemental academic instruction which many of these students may not get at home. In the classroom, they work closely with the teacher to appropriately address grade-level content pacing and skill development. Currently, 66 seniors spend time in 28 schools, mentoring and tutoring children for an average of over two hours a day, for a total of 15 hours per week.

The initiative “Make Your M.A.R.K.” (M.A.R.K. stands for Meaningful, Accomplished, Reflective and Knowledgeable) at Estates Elementary School promotes the engagement of parents in their child’s education. The school offers a tangible and visual way to encourage parent involvement—by giving parents different colored marks for their participation in varying school initiatives and for classrooms to then compete for the most marks. This system also enables the school to identify areas of parental involvement that may need bolstering (a shortage of marks of a certain color means parents are not engaging in the activity associated with that color). The school has found that involving students has created increased ownership and accountability for parents.

When children are striving to keep up with social norms, attending school in ragged clothes is often embarrassing and can hinder learning. Locke Elementary School partnered with the school’s PTA and a non-profit called New Threads of Hope to create Locke’s Clothing Closet where low-income families were able get new clothes for free. Inadequate clothing can contribute to, among other things, children skipping school and experiencing behavioral and academic problems. On the day of the event, volunteers and local agencies laid out clothing according to gender and size and handed the clothes out as family members arrived. A Resource Guide was available with information on counseling services, substance abuse services, housing, food and medical support services, childcare, county offices, and disability services. Over 80 families attended.

Student-centered and student-led, the program gives students an opportunity to apply higher order thinking skills, be creative and participate in real world, hands-on learning. Cluster titles include “Animals in their Homes,” “Life in the Ocean,” “Painting” and “Police Work.” Volunteers and others in the community assist and educate students on their themes. The effort culminates in an evening event called “Focus on Achievement” where families can experience the final products crafted by their child.

Countryside High School offers two initiatives in which students and families thrive: the Career Center which has been operational since 1999 and the College and Career Fair which started in 2009. The school discovered that when families and students have a vested interest in a major endeavor, student success climbs and parental involvement soars. The Career Center introduces students and families to opportunities and resources for college and career preparation, such as afterschool and weekend employment, online career assessments, and tips for résumé writing and interviews. What began as an onsite career guidance center is now a model for other schools. The Gulf Middle School ESOL Parent Involvement program is a three-tiered effort. In addition to providing the typical support to ESOL students by employing a full-time ESOL instructional assistant, the program provides three additional support systems: quarterly meetings for ESOL families where critical information is offered, such as how to change the setting on the school website so that it will read in another language and how to find their child’s grades (this meeting is conducted in Spanish but translations to other languages are sometimes available); afterschool English class for ESOL students wherein students can practice English in a non-threatening environment; and free weekly English language tutoring sessions in the evenings for parents.

Initially, the school designed a program that provided academic resources and strategies for parents to use at home. Now, in its second year of implementation, the school hosted an event specifically for Latino families. They set up stations with bilingual teachers, bilingual counselors and bilingual legal advisors who offered Hispanic parents concrete help how to help your child with homework when it’s in English; apps for translating from English to Spanish; how to prepare for middle school; legal advice for those reluctant to ask questions elsewhere; and resources for ESOL students. The Boys and Blue program at Congress Middle School is a police mentoring program that pairs officers from Boynton Beach Police Department with male adolescent students (grades 6-8). The program was designed to build relationships between a specific male student and a community police officer whom the student sees and interacts with outside of school, such as an officer that may have already visited the student’s home for truancy issues. The officer mentor meets with the student mentee for 45 minutes each week, focusing on social studies concepts and strengthening their relationship. The goals of this program are also to educate police officers in adolescent child development, enabling them to better provide age-appropriate interventions. Most importantly however, the school hopes to provide children with someone in law enforcement that they can trust – someone who will guide them in becoming successful students and honorable, responsible adults.
