\*\*Vocational economic disadvantagement criteria - One or more of the following indicators may be used to determine vocational economic disadvantagement:

- The student or the parent or quardian of the student is eligible for Aid to Families with Dependent Children, food stamps, a Student Education Opportunity Grant, federal vocational workstudy, a Job Training Partnership Act program, or free or reduced priced lunches.
- The student or the parent or guardian of the student has an annual income at or below the official poverty line established by the Director of the Office of Management and Budget.
- The student is the recipient of a Pell Grant or comparable state program of need-based financial assistance.
- 0 The student DOES NOT meet the complete description under codes B, F or S and specifically **DOES NOT** require special services and assistance in order to succeed in vocational education programs, but DOES otherwise qualify as economically disadvantaged under one or more of the subparts of the definitions.

Several examples include, but are not limited to:

- A student, who does not need special services noted in B, F or S, but whose parent or guardian has an annual income at or below the official poverty level.
- A student who is a prisoner, but who does not need the special services noted in B. F. or S.
- A JTPA student who does not need the special services noted in B, F or S.
- A student who is a parent eligible for Aid to Families with Dependent Children, but who does not need the special services noted in B, F or S.
