

The Florida Department of Education, Bureau of Exceptional Education and Student Services, obtains input regarding the activities described above from the State Advisory Committee for the Education of Exceptional Students (SAC) and the Bureau/District Partners (BDP). The BDP comprises exceptional student education and student services directors from districts across the state who assist the Bureau in the development and implementation of legislation, policy, and procedures, and includes representation from both small and large and urban and rural districts. Input regarding the most effective use of funds to meet designated state priorities and school district needs also is obtained through periodic conference calls with districts conducted by the Bureau Chief as well as other formal and informal communication throughout the year with districts and the Bureau's IDEA-funded discretionary projects.

¹ Each State may reserve for each fiscal year not more than the maximum amount the State was eligible to reserve for State administration under this section for fiscal year 2004 or \$800,000 (adjusted in accordance with 20 U.S.C. 1411(e)(1)(B)), whichever is greater; and each outlying area may reserve for each fiscal year not more than 5 percent of the amount the outlying area receives under 20 U.S.C. 1411(b)(1) for the fiscal year or \$35,000, whichever is greater.

Florida has statutes, rules, or policies imposed that represent obligations that go beyond those required under IDEA or the implementing Federal regulations. The document provided to school districts informing them of State-imposed rules, regulations, policies that are not required by IDEA or Federal regulations was disseminated electronically to school districts via memorandum from the Bureau Chief on February 8, 2011. A summary of the requirements is included as **Attachment 1**.

**State-Imposed Rules, Regulations, and Policies
Exceeding the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)**

Summary of Requirements

Section 300.199 of Title 34 of the Code of Federal Regulations requires that States identify in writing to local educational agencies any State-imposed rule, regulation, or policy that is not required under IDEA or the implementing Federal regulations. Florida has statutes, rules, or policies that reflect school district obligations with regard to actions taken on behalf of students with disabilities that go beyond those required under IDEA or its regulations. Those requirements are summarized below.

- Section 1002.39, Florida Statutes (F.S.), requires the school district to notify the parent of a student with a disability of all options available pursuant to the McKay Scholarship for Students with Disabilities Program.
- S. 1003.438, F.S., allows certain students with disabilities to earn a special diploma based on requirements prescribed by the district school board.
- S. 1003.57, F.S., requires school districts to provide information to parents of sensory-impaired students describing the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind and other available programs and methods of instruction and to inform parents of students with physical or developmental disabilities of all available services appropriate for the disability, in addition to the services in their children's IEPs.
- S. 1003.573, F.S., requires schools to notify the parents of any incident of restraint or seclusion of their child with a disability and submit a report of the incident to the Department of Education.
- Rule 6A-6.03028, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.), requires the district to begin transition planning at age fourteen (14); provide an interpreter at a meeting that is attended by the student if the student needs that service; and obtain signed consent from the parent for a student to receive instructional accommodations that would not be permitted on the statewide assessments and acknowledge in writing that he or she understands the implications of such accommodations. In addition, if a student does not participate in the regular state assessment, the district must provide the parent with information regarding the implications of such nonparticipation.
- Rule 6A-6.0331, F.A.C., requires general education interventions to be implemented for struggling students.
- Rule 6A-6.03311, F.A.C., provides that the right to notice of a meeting is retained as a shared right of the parent and the student upon the transfer of rights of a student who reaches the age of 18.
- Rule 6A-1.0943, F.A.C., describes the criteria applied by IEP teams to determine whether a student with a disability will participate in the statewide alternate assessment and the criteria applied by IEP teams and the Commissioner of Education to determine whether a student with a disability is eligible for consideration for exemption from statewide assessment under extraordinary circumstances.
- Rule 6A-1.09431, F.A.C., describes the criteria applied by IEP teams and the Commissioner of Education to determine whether a student with a disability seeking a standard diploma is eligible for consideration for exemption from graduation assessment requirements under extraordinary circumstances.

Public Participation Requirements

The purpose of this memorandum is to notify school districts and other interested parties of Florida's Annual State Application Under Part B of IDEA for Federal Fiscal Year 2011 (Part B Application).

In order to receive a grant under Part B of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), states must submit an application annually. The public participation requirements relevant to Part B are described in the Part B regulations at section 300.165 of Title 34 of the Code of Federal Regulations and in section 441(b)(7) of the General Education Provisions Act (GEPA). States are required to make the Part B Application available to the public for a period of 60 days and accept comments for a period of 30 days.
