Executive Summary

Pasco-Hernando State College (PHSC) continues to shape its history and expand its future by continuing to strive for improvement in retention, persistence and completion of students. In furtherance of these efforts, four areas were identified in the Performance Funding Improvement Plan to assist the College with student success via the following initiatives: community and economic development partnerships; development of a faculty alert program facilitating intervention strategies; improvement in the success rates of students on academic suspension; and increasing student use of instructional labs.

To ensure successful implementation of the Performance Improvement Plan, PHSC began weekly systematic monitoring of student success through the Retention Behavior Inventory (RBI) data reporting program. The RBI program has been hosted weekly since September in an on-line format enabling college administrators, staff and faculty to log in from any location and receive a 20 minute update on the progress of the objectives in the Performance Improvement Plan and other data related to student retention, persistence and completion. The RBI program began with eight staff reporters and twenty participants on the President's Administrative Leadership Team. Success of the program is evidenced by additional staff and faculty who have joined the weekly updates. To date, over 80 administrators, faculty and staff have participated during the fall term. Several campuses and departments host weekly "watch parties" where the participants view the updates and meet afterward to discuss the data and brainstorm on interventions for student success.

These efforts have produced excellent results for the PHSC Performance Improvement Plan. The following is a summary of evidence that shows PHSC has exceeded mid-year Performance Improvement Plan goals. In the past three months, PHSC has hired an Executive and Assistant Director for the President's Institute for College Preparation, Completion, Certification and Leadership Development. This Institute, in collaboration with the College's academic departments, has helped the department to strengthen communication with local workforce entities to plan for development of new programs and modification of existing ones. Additionally, the College has implemented a highly successful Faculty Alert program which facilitated student success and retention alerts submitted by faculty teaching Fall term developmental education and "gateway courses". All students who received a faculty alert were provided appropriate intervention strategies. Furthermore, academically suspended students who completed the newly created Academic Success Seminar demonstrated a three percent increase in academic success. Finally, PHSC significantly increased the use of the Teaching Learning (Academic Success) Centers. The aforementioned demonstrates the College's positive impact on student retention related behaviors and in strengthening opportunities for our students and community.

This well except the goal of 100 early alerts. Academic advisors provided follow phone call and e-mail interventions to 100% of the students for whom early alerts were received. Forty-nine percent (49%) of all received were for students risking course failure/withdrawals. Preliminary data in Fall 2015 indicates a 1% increase in students a minimal final grade of "C". One hundred forty-eight students completed the online course and were allowed to enroll after review of their written appeal, a meeting with the assistant dean, and final approval by the campus provost. One hundred percent of the students granted an academic suspension appeal waiver received an email from the Coordinat Retention inquiring about their academic status and encouraging academic success. Additionally, Peer Mentors promoted Teaching Center (TLC) usage, tutoring, and academic coaching of weekly basis. The Academic Success Seminar has proven to be successful. Six percent (66%) of the students achieved a 2.0 or higher this term which is a 5% increase over the baseline of 61%. Classroom visits, peer mentor reach out efforts, attendance at campus engagement events, marketing initiatives, and the use of Academic Support Plans contributed to a Fall 2015 TLC average monthly student usage rate of 4,484. 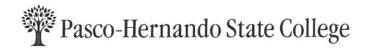

Early Alert Program

The baseline success rate of the students in developmental education and gatekeeper courses was originally calculated at 69.65%. This included students with a minimum final academic grade of "C" and "N" grades. "N" grades are given to students taking developmental math who have not completed all the modules within the course but were passing the modules that were completed. Since the "N" grade does not designate overall success we recalculated the baseline data to exclude the "N" grade. The new baseline success rate (prior to the Early Alert Program) is 64.8%. Preliminary Fall 2015 data shows the success rate at 65.8%--a 1% increase.

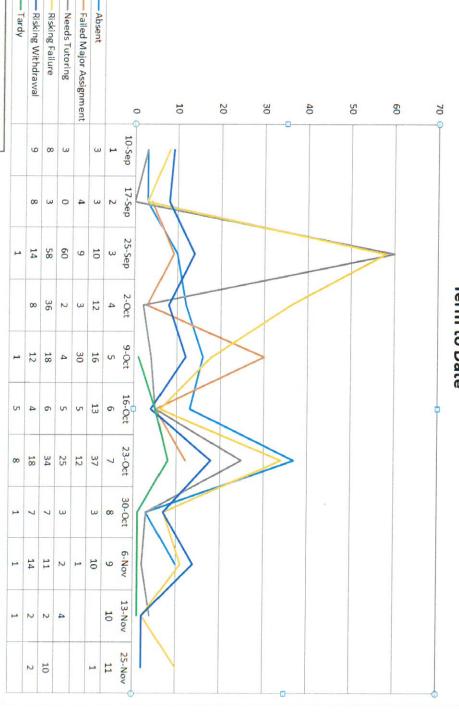

FACULTY ALERT WEEK-BY-WEEK

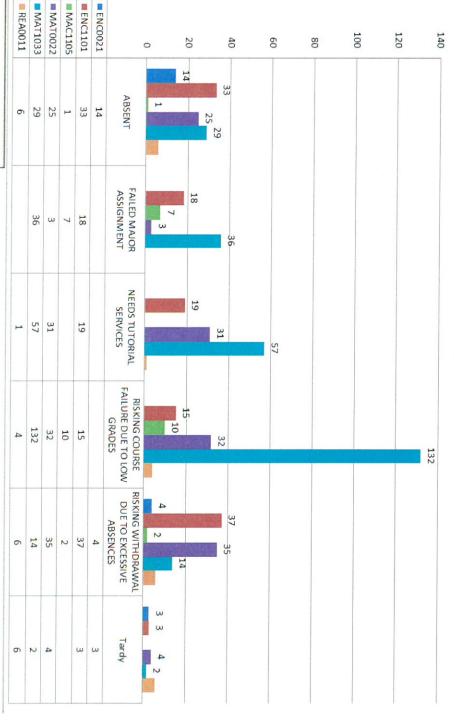
Early Alert Trends Term to Date





FACULTY ALERTS BY COURSE

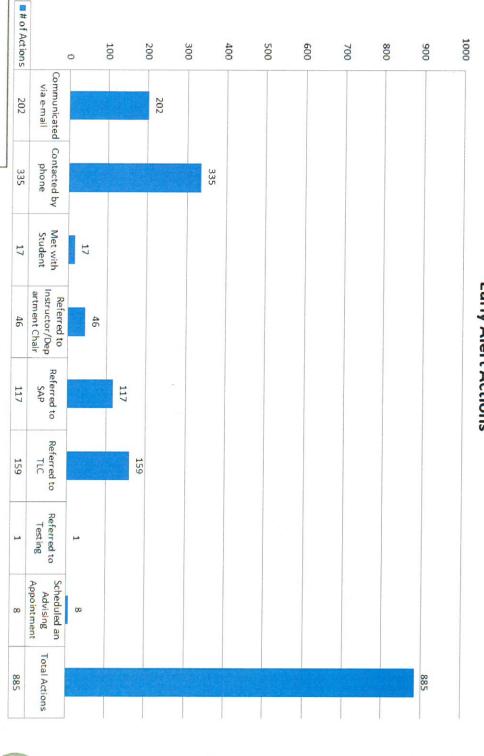
20161 Faculty Early Alerts Term to Date





FACULTY ALERT ADVISOR ACTIONS







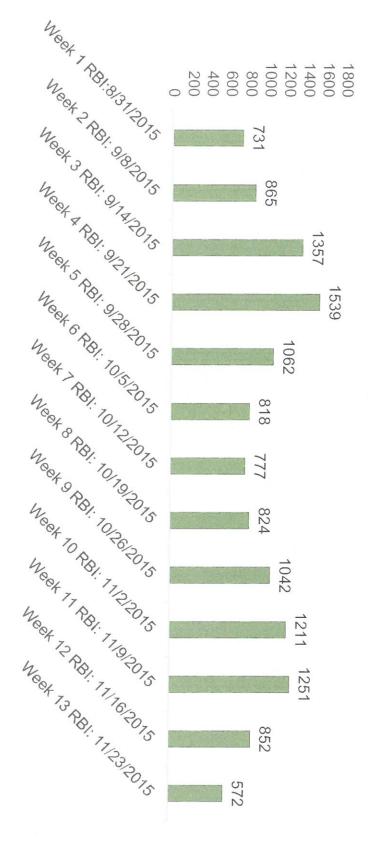

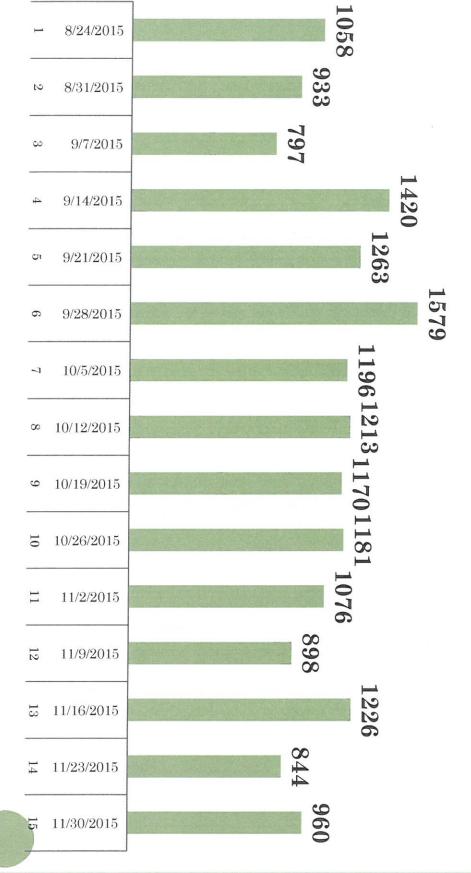
