

# **HSHT in Closing**

- Business Execs: General sentiment that opportunities to bring people with disabilities (PWDs) into the workplace through internship or mentoring-type program was very useful in breaking down misperceptions of employers and employees with regard to PWDs work capabilities
- Internships and use of interns is negatively correlated with the perception that positions in their companies are unsuitable for PWDs



# **HSHT in Closing**

- Young job seekers who participated in Able Trust programs reported 2-3 years later, that career skills training and internships were the most valuable in getting and keeping a job.
- The value of internships and work experiences is supported by research and anecdotal information, a strong case for including in all HS students' education, especially HS student with disabilities.
