Comments: In terms of a regular economics course, I think the level is adequate, but wish the text would push the students occasionally, in particular with a bit more graphical presentation here and there.

My main concern is with the financial literacy section. I understand that the section has been added on for the new standards. My hope had been that more could have been incorporated. My thought is that for regular classes, more financial literacy should be taught, for honors, some but not as much as regular. I am less concerned with AP courses having to include financial literacy. As it stands in this text, all the financial literacy standards are there, but a lot of times in just a restatement of the standard. The financial literacy standards have underlying themes that could be brought out in the text. The financial literacy section is also lacking in interesting applications or activities. All that being said, the score for the text is reasonable as it does "check off" all the boxes. I just view this as an opportunity missed.
