As the Lead Mentor in our ESP program, I actively coach our newly hired teachers and am responsible for the success of 12 interns. In the role of Professional Development Contact, I develop and lead staff and team trainings. In School-Based Team meetings, I am dedicated to our struggling and EBD students' academic needs with evidence based interventions. Guiding our School-Wide Positive Support, allowed us to achieve Level 2 Welcoming and Inclusive School. As SAC Chair, I led the initiative to improve parent attendance and was able to increase stakeholder participation by 32%.



Elementary has taught me great diversity from embracing the joy of Kindergarteners as they explore the educational experience for the first time, to inspiring 5th graders as they transition to middle school. My students matriculate to their respective middle schools, where they are on the honor roll, and have the self-confidence to pursue leadership roles in their choice programs.

In addition, I learned a tremendous amount from the entire staff at Suncoast High School, where I had the privilege of taking part in administrative duties and mentoring, during my summer internship. High school taught me the intricacies of a well-organized master schedule, the importance of FTE data, and the necessity for formative assessments to monitor progress.
