

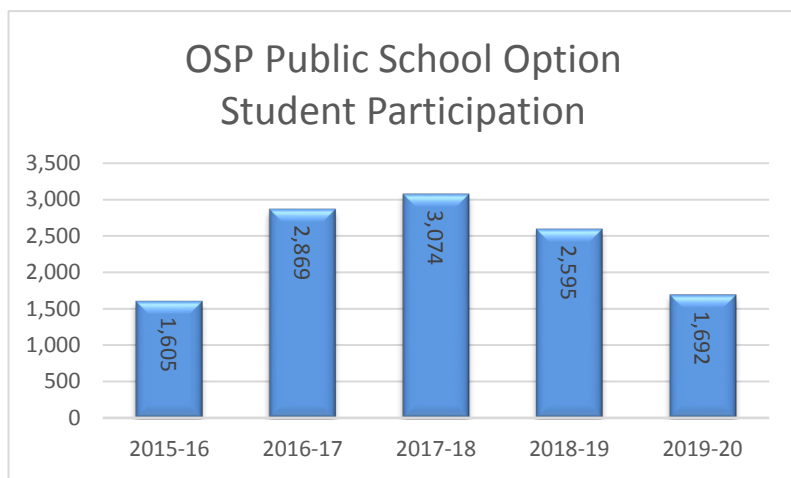


## Opportunity Scholarship Program Public School Option

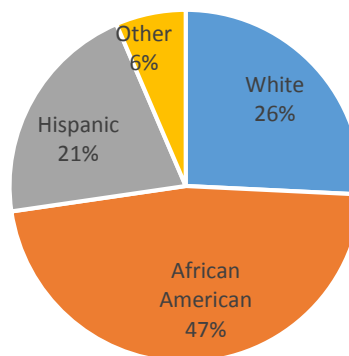
The purpose of the Opportunity Scholarship Program (OSP) is to provide enhanced opportunities for students to attend a high-quality public school. Florida's OSP was the first program of its kind in the nation and allows students attending a low-performing public school to choose a higher-performing public school.

Students who are enrolled or assigned to attend a Florida public school that received a grade "F" or three consecutive "D" are eligible for the Opportunity Scholarship. In addition, students entering kindergarten or first grade who have been notified that their assigned school is failing may also be eligible to participate. Students who participate in the Opportunity Scholarship Program may then continue to attend the higher-performing public school feeder pattern until the student graduates from high school.

A total of 1,692 students remained enrolled in the public option of the OSP during the 2019-20 school year. Of those students, 73% were eligible for free or reduced price lunch. African-American students were among the largest population to participate at 47%, followed by White students at 26% and Hispanic students at 21%.

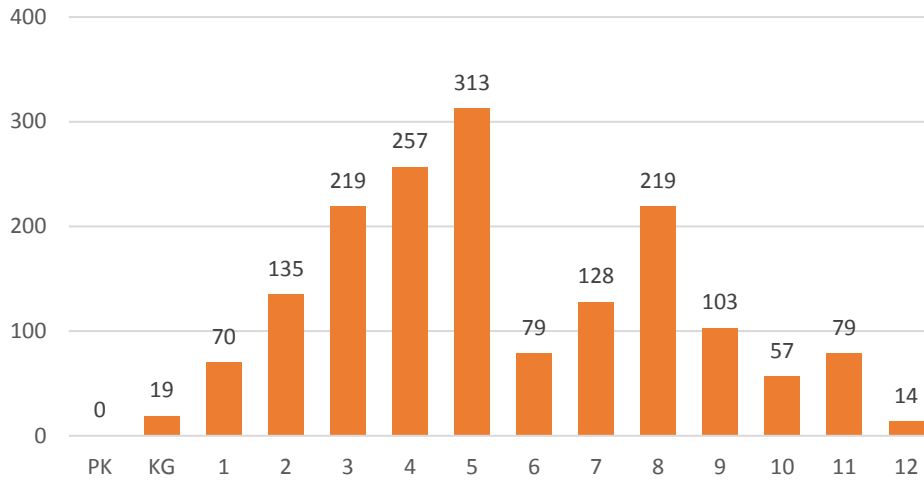

### OSP Program Requirements

<b>Statutory References:</b>	<b>s. 1002.38, F.S., Opportunity Scholarships</b> <b>s. 1001.42(20), F.S., related to district policies regarding OSP</b> <b>s. 1008.34(7) &amp; s. 1008.34(7)(b)1., F.S., set 2014-15 school grades as a baseline</b>
<b>Eligibility Criteria:</b>	OSP allows parents to choose a higher-performing public school if their children attended a school the year in which it received a grade "F" or received its third consecutive "D".  Students who are assigned to attend such a school in the upcoming school year are also eligible to choose a higher-performing public school.
<b>How to Participate</b>	
<b>District Notification:</b>	School districts must notify parents of their options following the release of school grades.
<b>Parent Initiation:</b>	Parents contact their local districts to enroll their child.
