Grading Florida Public Schools

2025-26

School grades provide an easily understandable metric to measure the performance of a school. Parents and the general public can use the school grade and its associated components to understand how well each school is serving its students. Schools are graded “A,” “B,” “C,” “D” or “F.” Each school is graded based on the components for which it has sufficient data. Schools must test at least 95% of their students.

The school grading system focuses the school grading formula on student success measures:

- Achievement
- Learning gains
- Graduation
- Acceleration success
- Maintaining a focus on students who need the most support

Components

In 2025-26, a school’s grade may include up to 12 components. There are five achievement components, as well as components for learning gains, learning gains of the lowest 25% of students, middle school acceleration, graduation rate and college and career acceleration. Each component is worth up to 100 points in the overall calculation.

Five Achievement Components – The five achievement components are English Language Arts, Grade 3 English Language Arts, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies. These components include student performance on statewide, standardized assessments, including the end-of-year (PM3) comprehensive progress monitoring assessments, alternate assessments and end-of-course (EOC) assessments. The components measure the percentage of full-year enrolled students who achieved a passing score.

Four Learning Gains Components – These components are learning gains in English Language Arts and Mathematics, as well as learning gains for the lowest performing 25% of students in English Language Arts and Mathematics. These components include student performance on statewide, standardized assessments, including the end-of-year (PM3) comprehensive progress monitoring assessments, alternate assessments and EOC assessments for the current year and the prior year. The components measure the percentage of full-year-enrolled students who achieved a learning gain from the prior year to the current year.

Middle School Acceleration – This component is based on the percentage of eligible middle school students who passed a high school level EOC assessment or industry certification.

Graduation Rate – The graduation rate is based on a four-year adjusted cohort of ninth grade students, and the rate measures whether the students graduate within four years of entering grade 9.

College and Career Acceleration – This component is based on the percentage of graduates from the graduation rate cohort who earned a passing score on an acceleration examination (qualifying AP, IB or AICE), earned a passing grade in a dual enrollment course that qualified for college credit, earned 300 clock hours through career dual enrollment courses in the same approved program, earned an Armed Services Qualification Test score and two course credits within the same military branch, or earned an industry certification.

School Grades Calculation

The points earned for each component are added together and divided by the total number of possible points to determine the percentage of points earned.

School Grading Percentages

Pursuant to [section \(s.\) 1008.34\(3\)\(c\)1., Florida Statutes \(F.S.\)](#), when over 75 percent of schools of a specific school type receive a grade of “A” or “B,” the grading scale for that school type is automatically adjusted to reset the minimum required percentage of points for each grade of “A,” “B,” “C,” or “D” at the next highest percentage point ending in numeral five (5) or zero (0), whichever is closest to the current percentage. The 2025-26 grading scales for high schools and combination schools were automatically adjusted upward because more than 75 percent of schools in each of these school types earned a grade of “A” or “B” in the 2024-25 academic year. The resulting grading scales are as follows.

Elementary Schools

- A = 62% of points or greater
- B = 54% to 61% of points
- C = 41% to 53% of points
- D = 32% to 40% of points
- F = 31% of points or less

Middle Schools

- A = 64% of points or greater
- B = 57% to 63% of points
- C = 44% to 56% of points
- D = 34% to 43% of points
- F = 33% of points or less

High and Combination Schools

- A = 65% of points or greater
- B = 60% to 64% of points
- C = 45% to 59% of points
- D = 35% to 44% of points
- F = 34% of points or less

Percent Tested

Schools must test 95 percent of their students.

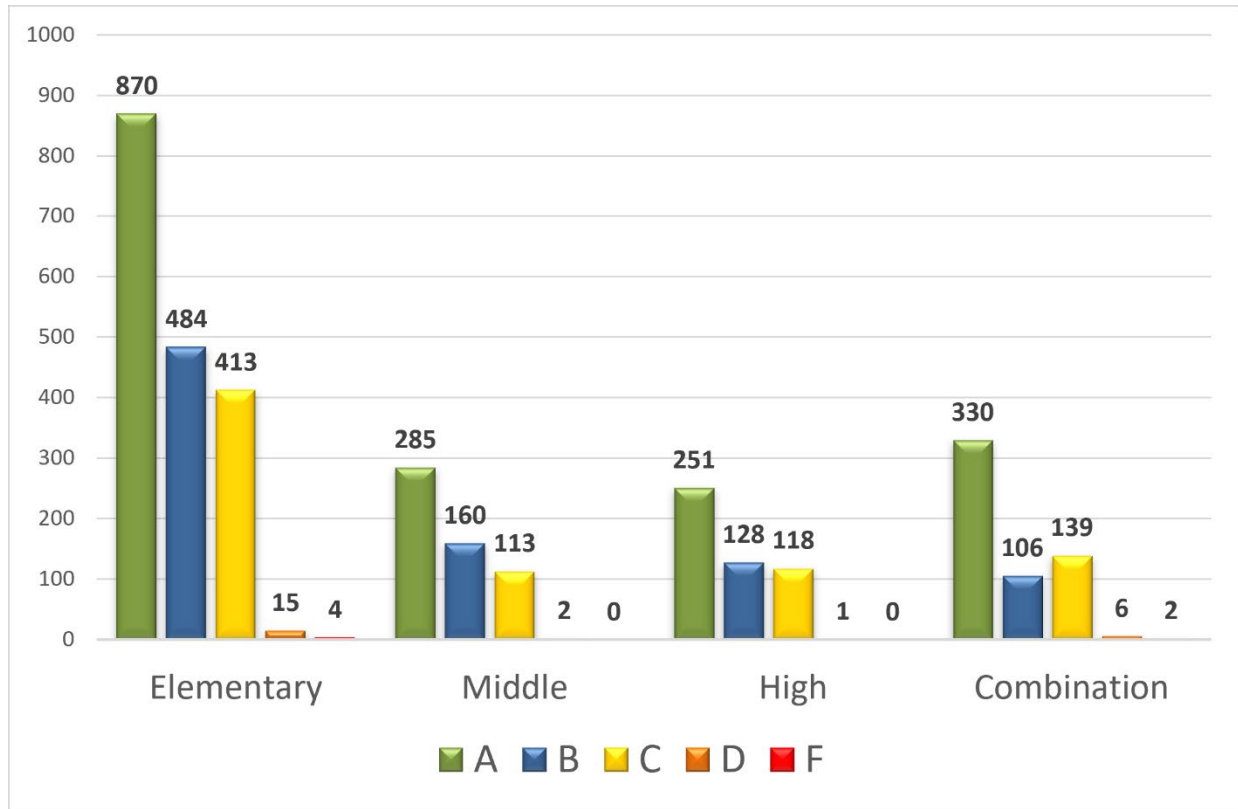

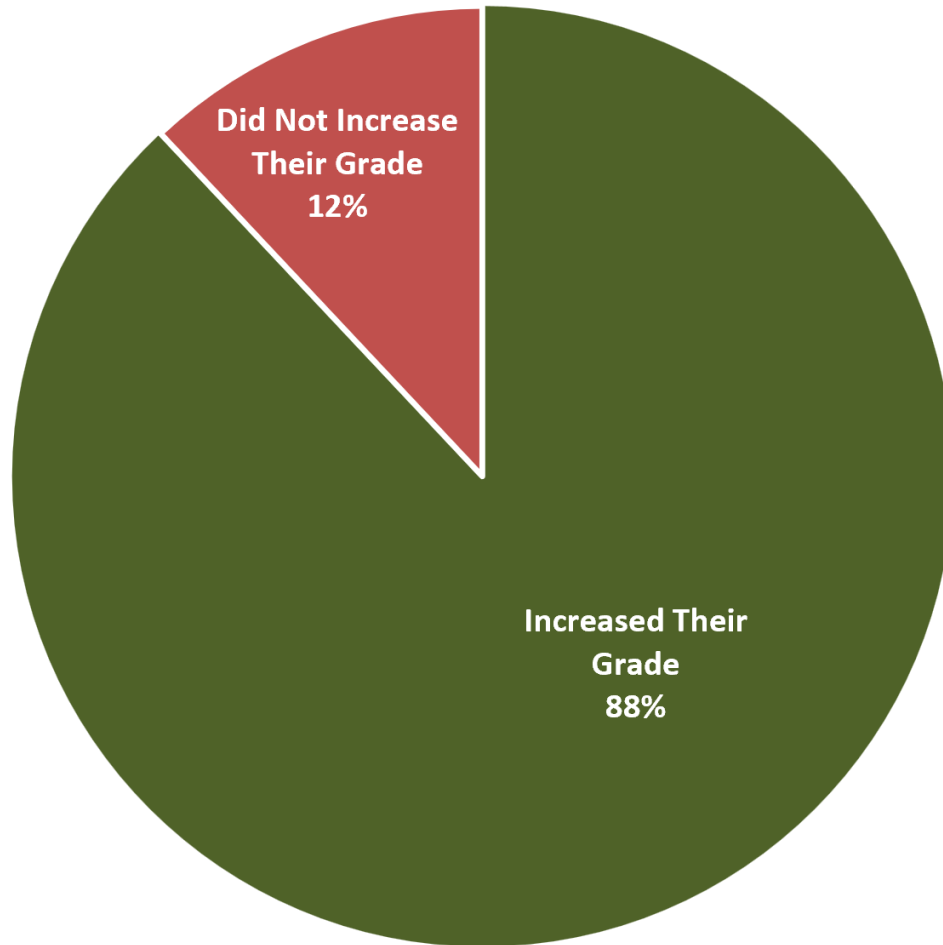

The chart above compares the grades schools earned in 2025 with the grades those schools earned in 2026. Schools in the cells shaded green increased their school grade in 2026. Schools in the cells shaded red had a reduction in their school grade. Schools in the cells shaded yellow had no change in their school grade. The data in the table are summarized below:

- 2,044 schools (60%) increased their grade or maintained an “A” in 2026
- 377 schools (11%) decreased their grade in 2026
- 968 schools (29%) had no change in their grade of “B,” “C,” “D” or “F” in 2026

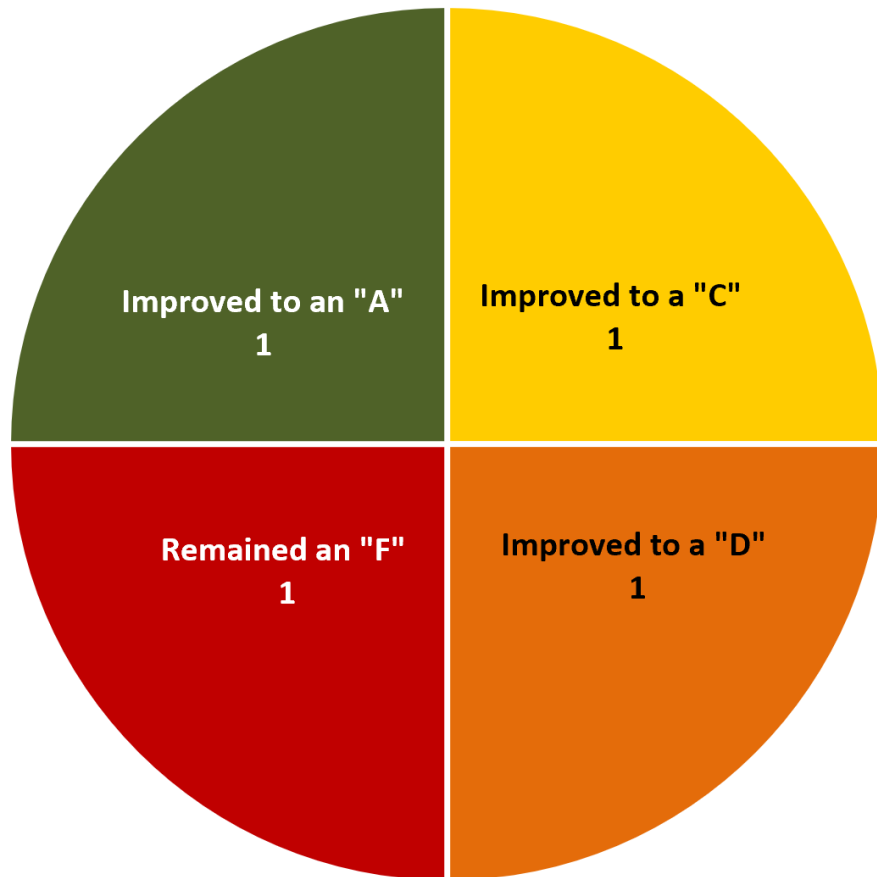
88% of Schools Graded “D” or “F” in 2025 Improved Their Grade in 2026

There were 60 “D” or “F” schools in 2025 that received a school grade in 2026. Of these “D” or “F” schools in 2025, 53 improved their grade.

75% of Schools Graded "F" in 2025 Improved Their Grade in 2026

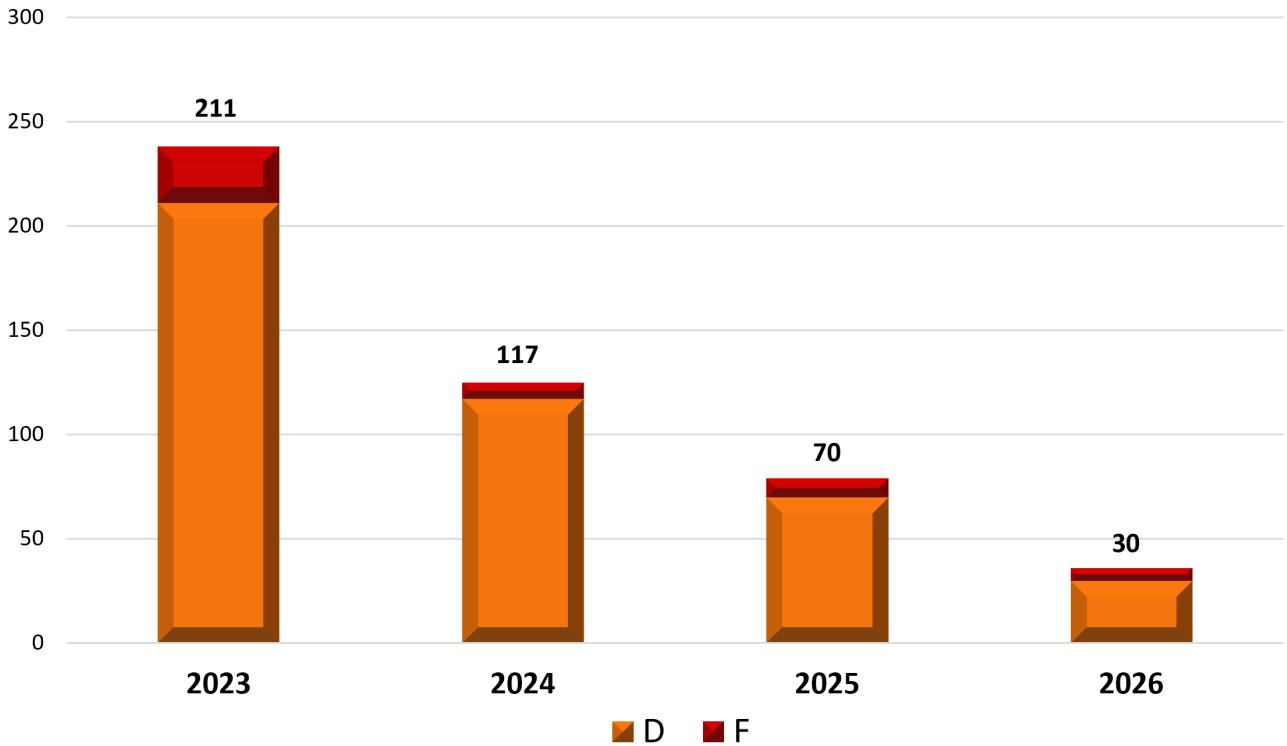

There were 4 "F" schools in 2025 that received a school grade in 2026. Of these "F" schools in 2025, 1 improved to an "A," 1 improved to a "C," 1 improved to a "D," and 1 remained an "F."

Florida's Focus on Low-Performing Schools is Paying Off

The number of "D" or "F" schools has declined 86% since 2023 and the number of "F" schools has declined 78% since 2023, the first year comprehensive progress monitoring was implemented.

In 2026, there was a total of 30 "D" or "F" schools and a total of 6 "F" schools.

Changes to Grading Scales for 2026-27

Section 1008.34(3)(c)1., F.S., as incorporated in State Board of Education Rule 6A-1.09981(4)(e)4., F.A.C., states that the grading scales shall be adjusted for the following school year’s school grades if the percentage of schools earning a grade of “A” or “B” in the current year represents 75% or more of all graded schools within a particular school type, which consists of elementary, middle, high and combination. The adjustment must reset the minimum required percentage of points for each grade of “A,” “B,” “C” or “D” at the next highest percentage ending in the numeral 5 or 0, whichever is closest to the current percentage.

For the 2025-26 school grades, the percentage of elementary schools earning an “A” or “B” was 76%, the percentage of middle schools earning an “A” or “B” was 79%, the percentage of high schools earning an “A” or “B” was 76% and the percentage of combination schools earning an “A” or “B” was 75%. Given this, the grading scales for each school type will be adjusted as described in the paragraph above for the 2026-27 school grades. Additionally, the grading scale for district grades will be adjusted to mirror the combination school grading scale pursuant to requirements in Rule 6A-1.09981(5), F.A.C. The tables below show these changes in addition to the impact of applying the 2026-27 scales to the 2025-26 results.

School Improvement Ratings

School improvement ratings are calculated for alternative schools and exceptional student education (ESE) center schools that choose to receive a school improvement rating in lieu of a school grade, as defined in Rule 6A-1.099822, F.A.C., Rule 6A-1.099828, F.A.C., and under the authority of ss. 1008.341 and 1008.3415, F.S. As of 2024-25, pursuant to s. 1003.51(5), F.S., ratings are also calculated for Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) education programs that provide education services to students receiving detention, prevention or day treatment services.

Components

Schools that elect a school improvement rating in lieu of a school grade will have the rating based on student learning gains for English Language Arts and/or Mathematics, including retake assessments and concordant scores; schools will be rated on only those components for which they have sufficient data. Sufficient data exists when at least ten students are eligible for inclusion in the calculation for the component; eligibility criteria are described within the guide to calculations, which can be found on the [School Grades website](#).

English Language Arts Learning Gains – This component includes student performance on statewide, standardized English Language Arts assessments, including the end-of-year (PM3) comprehensive progress monitoring assessments, alternate assessments, retake assessments and concordant scores, and measures student learning gains from one year to the next year.

Mathematics Learning Gains – This component includes student performance on statewide, standardized mathematics assessments, including the end-of-year (PM3) comprehensive progress monitoring assessments, alternate assessments, EOC assessments, retake assessments and concordant scores. This component measures student learning gains from one year to the next year.

School Improvement Ratings Calculation

The points earned for each component for which there are sufficient data are added together and divided by the total number of possible points to determine the percentage of points earned.

School Improvement Ratings Percentages

- Commendable = 50% of points or greater
- Maintaining = 26% to 49% of points
- Unsatisfactory = 25% of points or less

Percent Tested

Schools must test at least 80 percent of their students to receive a rating. To be eligible for a rating of Commendable, schools must test 90 percent or more of their students.

District Grades for 2026

The commissioner assigns a letter grade of “A,” “B,” “C,” “D” or “F” to each school district annually as provided in s. 1008.34(5), F.S., and Rule 6A-1.09981, F.A.C., based on the components and processes for school grades. The district’s grade is calculated as if the district’s students are enrolled in one large combination school. All students who are full-year-enrolled in the district are included in the district’s grade. This means that students who were not full-year-enrolled at an individual school but who were full-year-enrolled within the district are included in the district’s grade.

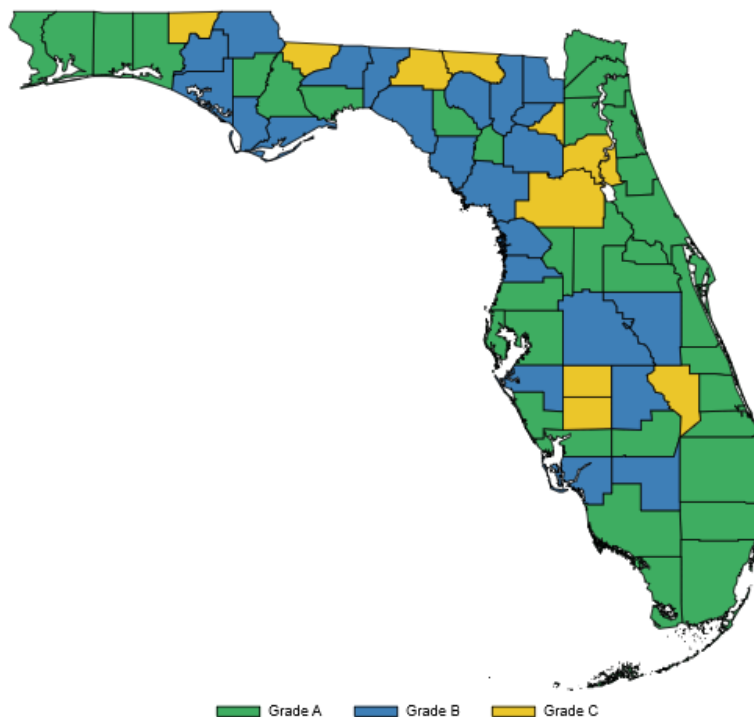

District Grading Percentages

Rule 6A-1.09981(4)(e)3., F.A.C., requires that the grading scale used to determine district grades is the same scale used to determine grades for combination schools. The resulting grading scale is as follows:

- A = 65% of points or greater
- B = 60% to 64% of points
- C = 45% to 59% of points
- D = 35% to 44% of points
- F = 34% of points or less

For the 2025-26 district grades, 34 districts received an “A,” 23 districts received a “B,” 10 districts received a “C” and no districts received a “D” or an “F.” The map below shows each district and the grade the district received in 2026. Districts that received a “C” are shaded yellow, districts that received a “B” are shaded blue, and districts that received an “A” are shaded green. The table on the next page summarizes the distribution of grades by district.
