Florida's students continue to achieve at high levels. Our statewide high school graduation rate reached a record 92.2 percent for the 2024-25 school year, the highest in Florida's history. We are [committed](#) to an education that transmits the enduring knowledge of Western Civilization, forms young people for the responsibilities of democratic citizenship, and equips them with the skills, habits, or virtues needed for meaningful work and a well lived life.
