White Cane Safety Day Webinar

Just as the white cane transformed travel for blind adults in 1945, the innovation of the pediatric belt cane in 2017 has transformed O&M for children with mobility visual impairment or blindness (MVI/B). This webinar will include the results of multiple research studies on more than 800 children with an MVI/B who demonstrated significant improvement in gait, pace and amount of physical activity once they began wearing the belt cane. The Florida Low Vision Initiative (FLVI) Newsletter

FLVI, an Individuals with Disabilities Education Act-funded state project, through Florida Supportive Services for Students with Visual Impairments, is accepting referrals for the 2025-26 school year. Low vision services are also available to students with low vision, prekindergarten four-year olds through eighth grade, who receive direct instruction from a teacher of students with visual impairments (TSVI), as documented in the student's individual educational plan (IEP).

FLVI participants:

- Receive a no-cost, comprehensive low vision evaluation;
- Are eligible to receive glasses and a wide variety of portable optical aids, when prescribed for specific low vision needs; and
- Receive training in the use of glasses and portable optical aids.
